Evidencing the impact of the primary PE and sport premium

In <u>2022 – 2023</u>, St Andrews Primary School received <u>£17,180</u> Primary PE & School Sport Premium. This will be used in conjunction with other grants and funds from the school budget to raise standards in curriculum **Physical Education**, **School Sport**, **Physical Activity** and Healthy living (PESSPA).

There was a total of £5046.76 left over that was used to pay towards £5181.75 GoWell SLA for the 2022-23 academic year. Underspend to carry into 2022-2023

Vision: ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

Objective: To build **capability** within school and achieve **self-sustaining improvement** in the **quality** of PE and sport in primary schools against the 5 key grant condition indicators:

- 1. the engagement of <u>all</u> pupils in regular physical activity kick-starting healthy active lifestyles. Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that primary school children undertake at least 30 minutes of physical activity a day in school.
- 2. the profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
- 3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. increased participation in competitive sport

Used Premium to pay for Go Well SLA 2023-2024 £4575 and Education Enterprise 2023-2024 £3150 = £7725.

Swimming is a national curriculum requirement and by the end of key stage 2 pupils are expected to be able to swim confidently and know how to be safe in and around water. There are 3 national curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety. See the below table.

The following year 6 attainment data is provided from swimming lessons within the County Durham Swimming SLA provision. Year 5 and 6 were priority. It is not the data that we were hoping for but there has been a 2% improvement in perform a range of recognised strokes and perform a safe self-rescue to the previous year.
